A number of loyal people are interested in the organization of a club, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining bath houses and bathing beach on the Colonial Hotel property.

The plans call for cleaning and sanding a portion of the shore and extending a lot 150 ft into the water, erecting a bathing house, with private dressing rooms for members, and building a walking boat dock to extend into the lake about 100 feet.

Permission from Manager Kelsey of the Colonial Hotel for the use of the necessary land, has already been secured, and a number of residents of Florida and Louisiana have offered to subscribe their share of the money needed to defray the expense.

This is one of the best plans for the improvement of the natural advantages of the lake that has ever been started here, and is one which should appeal to every man and woman who enjoys bathing and swimming. This club will exclude all undesirable persons from membership, and enable its members to enjoy the privilege of the club house and beach in the company of their friends without the annoyance common to public bathing places.

### Cotton Mill for Laurel Hill

The Clear League of Laurel Hill met last Thursday evening to discuss plans for the establishment of a cotton mill at that place, and it is reported that so much interest was declared that the project begins to look like business.

Best evidence of the enthusiasm is displayed by the fact that a substantial sum was subscribed on the spot, and those present pledged themselves to raise the rest of the money necessary before a given time. Laurel Hill seems to be "growing after things" in the right way to get them, and afford a good example by which other communities might well profit.

### School Tax is Growing

According to statistics compiled in the State Department of Education the school county taxes for schools in Alabama last year amounted to \$291,100,000. Forty five counties of the state levied this special tax, and Chief Clerk W. P. Pugh of the department, said Tuesday that if the remaining twenty-two counties levied a similar tax, the total tax fund would be increased to \$745,000.

The department is working to ward this end, to have every county in the state levy a similar tax for special school purposes. Of the forty-five counties now levying this tax, forty-one counties have a one mill tax, Mobile and Baldwin counties have a three mill tax, Escambia county a two mill tax and Jefferson county a one and a half mill tax.

The law in regard to levying of this tax says that when a petition signed by not less than 250 qualified electors and freeholders, and presented to the county commissioners or the board of trustees, an election on this question may be held. To carry this tax, the law requires not less than three-fifths of those voting. The law also says that the tax shall be assessed for not less than two years.

A very good example of the success of this law, according to the department, is in Crenshaw county. This county in 1904 levied a one mill tax for two years. Of the votes cast 1,250 voted in favor of the assessment 221 voted against the tax. In 1910, or just a few weeks ago, a second election was held in Crenshaw county on the same question, as the five years had expired. At this time 573 voted for the tax and only 19 against it. The tax, too, was voted to be assessed for two years instead of five years.

This tax would certainly seem to be a step in the right direction. Good schools are the first requirement in any city, county or state, and will do more toward building up a community than any other single factor. A man will willingly take long chances on locating his business in a new town provided he can be assured of the proper school facilities for his children, and a small town with good schools, will draw new families much quicker than a larger place with poorer school advantages. We would be glad to see this tax established in every county in the state and the above figures seem to show that where it has been applied it has met with heartiest approval.

Here are a few specimens: For Constipation, Especially in Children. — Take Bark-Worms, wash them well in White-wine to cleanse them, but so that they may not be too long in the wine; then apply to the Worms with a moderate Heat, and so far as that they may be moderately relaxed to Powder of one Ounce of which add a pretty Quantity of Grains of Ambergris, both to perfume the Powder (whose Seed is said to rattle in the Urine); mix this with the washing of Cori-leaf in Mouth with fair Water not too cold.
