The Election.

Elections returned at this writing indicate a democratic landslide. Woodrow Wilson carries New Jersey for governor; Julian Harman leads for governor in Indiana; Simon Bolivar for governor of Connecticut; John A. Dix, governor of New York; E. N. Foss, governor of Massachusetts. The returns show that the democrats will have a safe working majority in the next congress.

There were 220 votes polled at Florida, 21 being republicans and 201 democrats.
