Shooting at Lockhart.

Yesterday morning, at Lockhart, a negro, named Edward Cross, was shot by officers P. W. Rags and T. H. Green, who, during the course of a search, charged him with assault.

Tuesday evening Col. H. C. Jones, of another negro, named Joseph Paul, and set him at liberty, that it required repeated threats to make the negro submit.

A warrant was issued issued by Mayor Parker for Cross's arrest, and the officers went to Lockhart Wednesday morning to secure his release. Upon their arrival, they found that man in a negro dance hall run by Frank Gerry.

The officers separated and approached the house from different directions to intercept the possibility of Cross's escape. An Officer Rags approached the house from one side, Col. H. C. Jones from the other, and another shot gun through the window, then drew and opened fire upon Rags, missing him by a narrow margin. As he was reloading his gun for a second shot, the officers fired at him through the window, and at the same time, the negro, who had escaped from the other side of the house, also opened fire, bringing the negro down.

Cross was said to have borne an evil reputation, and is known to have been implicated in several more or less serious shooting affairs.

Officer Rags had a very narrow escape from death at the hands of the mortally-negro, and his coolness and quick action were undoubtedly the means of saving his life.

The negro had no friends or money as far as could be learned, and will be buried by the county.
