Samuel Gibbs French.

We copy the following from the Jacksonville Times-Union:

In the death of Gen. S. G. French at the hands of his son-in-law, "the iron-clad," one of the most notable figures in history is removed from active life.

General Gibbs French, who

was the oldest surviving graduate of West Point and the oldest surviving major general of the Union army, was born in Gloucester county, N. J., November 23, 1810. His ancestry can be traced to Thomas French, who belonged to one of the oldest and most illustrious English families. The French were Normans, and came to England with William the Conqueror, came to England with the Conqueror. The chivalry in which Thomas French was baptised in 1822 is still standing in Shuter Hayford, Herefordsshire, and a pedigree of this house was preserved by the family for many generations. One of the descendants of Thomas French, who had become a Quaker, emigrated to America, and became the founder of the American branch of the family.

Gen. French was educated at the academy in Bedington, N. J., and on June 20, 1835, was appointed cadet at West Point. He graduated from the academy in 1842, No. 18 of his class. He was as an artist was quite remarkable, and one of his water colors, representing a skirmish at Floraopolis, is still preserved at West Point as a monument.

He joined his regiment, the Third United States artillery, at Fort Monroe, N. C., in October, and two months later was ordered to Washington City, to prepare the drawings for "Soldier's Tactics," which were accepted without a single alteration. Then he was sent to Arizona, Texas, as joint secretary of the army of occupation under Gen. Taylor, and was with Taylor in the battles of Palo Alto, Resaca de la Palma and Monterey. At Monterey he distinguished himself by his bravery, and was promoted to the rank of first Lieutenant and captain. He was dangerously wounded in the battle of Buena Vista.

Upon his return from Mexico in 1847, he was presented with a sword by the people of New Jersey, at Trenton, and afterwards, by joint resolution of the state legislature, he was presented with a second sword by the state of New Jersey. He was placed on duty in the office of the quartermaster general while still in commission. In 1849 he was appointed captain and assistant quartermaster, and from that time, until he applied to be released in 1854, he was ordered to Fort Smith, Arkansas, where he remained until he resigned from the army.

His resignation was not accepted, but held, and the subject went to Wilmingtton, that was ready only to smoke a pipe in the dark.
